State grant will allow WHC to train new CNAs, nurses

Western Home Communities will use a \$1.34 million grant from Iowa Workforce Development to educate up to 135 new certified nurse aides (CNAs) and licensed practical nurses (LPNs) over three years.

Western Home Communities received the state's third-largest award in the second round of Iowa Health

Careers Registered Apprenticeship grants, designed to help train and expand the health care workforce.

"We're already seeing this large population of baby boomers coming to us for housing and services, and we've got to have more trained employees to meet the demand," explains CEO Kris Hansen. "This grant is really a win-win for us and people who want to start their nursing careers."

The state awarded 21 projects a total of \$13.5 million dollars to create nearly 1,500 apprenticeships. Recipients include public school districts, community colleges, universities, hospitals and senior living providers.

"It's going to take all of us being innovative and working together to develop the health care workforce lowa needs, so state funding is important," Hansen says. "We view it as a way to further our efforts to be an educational partner in the community." Continued from page one -

Western Home Communities has worked with Cedar Falls High School and its Center for Advanced Professional Studies (CAPS) for several years to train CNAs and is already planning a partnership with the Waterloo Career Center. Through the apprenticeship program, more high schools will be able to offer their students similar opportunities.

For CNAs who want to become a nurse, the apprenticeship program will create a new learn and earn option for becoming an LPN.



Chief Clinical Officer Wendy Ager, RN, BSN, knows that many CNAs want to pursue further education but can't afford to stop working. The apprenticeships will remove that financial barrier.

"This is exciting because providing the best care to residents is integral to how we operate as an organization," she says. "That's why we've been training CNAs in-house for several years now, and this grant lets us expand that to the next level."

Practical, hands-on lab training and on-the-job experience will be offered on-site at Western Home Communities, while AxisU will develop an online learning curriculum component.

Now that the grant has been awarded, Western Home Communities will finalize the program components and hopes to start awarding apprenticeships later this year.

The most unique and innovative feature is messaging. Found at the top of the app, it allows Western Home Communities residents to connect through interest groups like golfing, biking, walking, playing pickleball, volunteering, attending concerts and many more.

"Residents have asked for this capability and we've been investigating a way to do it for several years," says CEO Kris Hansen. "So I'm beyond excited to roll this out. And I'm most proud that this was created internally by our digital service and marketing teams."

Anyone can download the free app from the Google Play Store or Apple App Store; only WHC residents are able to join an interest group or access the resident portal.

First child care scholarships awarded to employees

Four employees, all single mothers, recently received scholarships to help them pay monthly child care expenses. Funds are awarded in monthly amounts of either \$200 or \$100, paid directly to the child care provider for a year.

"This award feels really good. It will help me have a little extra for doing fun things with my four-year-old daughter," says Cheyenne Creger, a CNA at Martin Suites since 2019. "I love caring for residents and making them

happy, and I really like working at Western Home a lot."

A housekeeper who received a scholarship says, "After a rough last few years, this is a wonderful way to feel rewarded and to have one less thing to stress over! I was very surprised to receive it and I'm grateful."

That sentiment was also expressed by Rachel Phillips, the director of resident engagement,

who says she makes more than what is allowed to receive child care assistance from other organizations. All the women agree that it's difficult to afford child care for two young children on one income.

"I work a full-time job that caters to our needs for food, shelter and school. The scholarship helps reduce the burden of rising daycare costs," explains Jofelle Corona, RN, BSN, a mother of two children, ages 7 and 3. "I am truly thankful to our sponsors."

Resident returns to broadcasting after storied career

It's hard to leave the host chair behind after a long career in radio and television. For villa resident Roy Justis, though, the allure of returning to that seat came from a desire to reconnect with his home town.

He called Cedar Falls Community Television (CFCT) Channel 15 a few years ago to inquire about volunteering and was quickly put to work as the host of a program called "Serving the Valley," a talk show which profiles non-profit organizations.

"Selfishly, I use these broadcasts to meet people," Justis explains. "Moving back to Cedar Falls after 50 years, things have changed. And it's easy for me to host, because I'm just curious – that's what got me into media in the first place."


Justis recently returned to recording new programs for Channel 15 after a long hiatus due to the pandemic and then a City Hall renovation. The subject matter is a natural fit for him; he served as president of the lowa City Rotary Club and currently belongs to the Cedar Falls club and the local Lions Club. He and his wife, Rita, help lead the Big Kids Bike Klub at WHC. The high school sweethearts, married in 1960, returned to their hometown in 2015.

"If you look, there's a lot to do here!" Roy enthuses. "It's been very enjoyable."

Long-timers in the Cedar Valley might recall Roy from his early days on-air. He started at KWWL AM radio at age 16, deejaying for a rock-and-roll show from 7 p.m. to midnight, Monday through Friday.

Then KWWL-TV bought the franchise rights for Bozo the Clown. Roy donned a red wig, oversized shoes, white face paint and a broad smile for two years, ad libbing his way through an hour and 45 minute live show where he introduced cartoons, interviewed sponsors and entertained local children.

"I was hiding behind the makeup," he laughs.

The job helped pay the bills and, in 1966, he took a job at KCRG in Cedar Rapids, reporting for radio during the week and television on the weekends. The young family settled in lowa City in 1968 for what would become a 37-year run at KXIC radio. Then Roy served as an adjunct instructor on the journalism faculty at U of lowa from 2006-2011.

You can catch "Serving the Valley" on CFU Cable Channel 15, typically at 4 p.m. and 5:30 a.m.


