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WHC travelers rerouted by Yellowstone floods

An "Away from Home with Western Home" trip west, postponed twice by the pandemic, finally took off early the morning of June 13 – only for travelers to be jolted a few hours later by the news of historic flooding that caused the closure of Yellowstone National Park.



The original itinerary had a scheduled visit to Yellowstone on June 17 with an overnight stay in one of the park's resorts before heading on to visit Jackson, Wyoming, and Grand Teton National Park.


Quick action by travel partner Legacy Tour & Travel found the group instead heading south from Cody, Wyoming, to Riverton for a night. Along the way, they visited The Heart Mountain Interpretive Center, which tells the stories of life as a Japanese American in an internment camp – an experience described as moving, disturbing and humbling.

The group then lunched in the town of Thermopolis and drove through Sinks Canyon where they fed trout and watched pronghorn on the hilly slopes; the hooved relative of goats and antelope is the fastest land animal in North America.

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

Chaplain's Corner: Character and conviction

Two things are essential to the Christian: character and conviction.

For the follower of Christ, character is defined as virtue, integrity, devotion and faithfulness to Christ. Or to borrow an old word, piety. Conviction is a firm belief that one has on a particular subject based on God's principles. But it goes beyond a belief. It's more than a placid, light view of something. Rather, it's something deeply seated, so much so that you live by it and are ready to die for it.

The apostle Paul said to young Timothy, "Take heed to yourself and to your doctrine." In other words, watch your life – which is your character – and your teaching – which are your convictions. In order to live victoriously, we need to have character as defined by the Word of God and convictions that can't be shaken and can't be moved.

As we are diligent in the care of our character and convictions, we will make a powerful influence and impact for the kingdom of God. Paul also reminded Timothy to "hold fast the pattern of sound words which you have heard from me, in faith and love which are in Christ Jesus." And the writer of Hebrews exhorted the believers to "hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for He who promised is faithful."

As the early church was tested for what they lived for, we also will be tested. Character and convictions are not negotiable – not open to discussion or modification. They are essential to overcoming evil and living triumphantly. Let's stand firm and be people of character and conviction.



False indigo is currently blooming and there's a variety of texture and color from coral bells, the mounding habit of a balloon flower waiting to bloom, the long slender leaves of



her daylilies and the geraniums, hostas and fluffy Elegant Feather - purchased on this year's Western Home Communities trip to Ionia and transplanted in large pots.

places, one with a patio. At first, I chose the one without a patio and then changed my mind," Betty remembers. "I'm so glad I have the patio."

This month a spectacular show of color will unfold from daylilies, tall phlox in purple and white, white iris, pink lace cap hydrangeas, blue delphinium, purple Veronica, Asiatic lilies, and a double Shasta daisy. One of Betty's favorites is the deep purple daylily. Smaller flowers add additional interest like a small pink lily called Tiny Tim, hens and chicks, and red baby dahlias.

When she finds time to relax outside, there's entertainment from the antics of Mallards, robins, squirrels and doves as they set up homes, chase each other or just wander through the courtyard.

Betty tends her garden often, moving plants to better light and creating space when plants

become crowded. She even tends to garden space in Windcove's raised garden beds, where she planted 21 tomato plants last year and gave away tomatoes all summer. This year, she has four tomato plants including her favorite,

Celebrity, and one grown from seed by her sonin-law. Oregano, lemon thyme, sage, and a "few" onions from her son grow in her garden space as well as rhubarb.

Betty enjoys gardening and says it gets her outside, away from the TV and iPad. The hobby has long been a family affair.

"My father had a huge garden and the Ottumwa newspaper featured him in articles all year long. My four children also enjoy gardening," says Betty. "I love choosing plants. One of my favorite parts of gardening is standing and looking at it when it's all weeded, planted and the flowers are in bloom."

Resident grows tomatoes without soil

Paul Klotz's hydroponic system for growing tomatoes outside his Windgrace home is clever. He learned some techniques from Sheila Sartorious' hydroponics seminar in April at Windridge, but already had a

design and supplies in mind.

His interest in hydroponics began a couple of years ago. Plans described online and in a book didn't suit him, so he created his own system that is stacked. He bought cheap lumber for the stand, a garden hose for the piping,

and downspouts that he bent, pop-riveted and silicone-sealed to contain the plants and water. Sliced

foam pool noodles hold the plants in place.

"I also found a small pump usually used for fish tanks," Paul explains. "I've learned that the system needs two gallons of water daily since the pump runs all the time and sits in full sun outside my apartment. I also use fertilizer specifically for hydroponics."



By June, Paul's plants had doubled in size.

The investment appears to be worth it: Paul's tomatoes more than doubled in size the first month. Next spring, he may take his system inside and start the tomatoes a little earlier.
