Remember Watergate, the energy crisis and 11% inflation?



47-year employee Peggy Makinster.

Yes, way back in 1974...after "Happy Days" debuted on ABC, "The Sting" won an Oscar for Best Picture, and President Nixon resigned, a 19-year-old Waterloo woman hopped on board a city bus for a job interview at The Western Home. A young Peggy

Makinster had to ask the bus driver where the organization was located.

On her first day of work in Nov. 1974, Peggy would've been shocked to know her last day of full-time employment would be more than 47 years later. She was bored and wanted to find another job, until a new business office manager arrived just in time to keep her busy.

"Back then we did everything by hand - time cards, payroll, accounts receivable, and accounts payable," she reflects. "I didn't even have a calculator for payroll. I used an adding machine and went through lots of paper tape balancing everything!" allowing her to work directly with residents and their families. It's the relationships she built along the way that she'll miss most.

"I used to know every single resident and employee, especially since I was doing payroll," Peggy says. "I wish I'd kept a journal, but I didn't think I'd be here this long!"

Peggy's first priority with her newly open schedule will be cleaning a craft room that turned into her pandemic-era office at home. She wants all the work papers back at WHC so she can organize card-making supplies. But she can't really imagine her life away from here. "It's hard to put into words," she reflects. "This has been my whole adult life."

Peggy plans to keep working one day a month and volunteering, too, so she can keep in touch with residents she's grown close to over the years. She and her sister, receptionist Suzanne Makinster, will likely still create cards with residents

"You probably won't ever really get rid of me!" she predicts.

Nor do we want to, Peggy. Enjoy your welldeserved retirement!

Over the years and decades, Peggy watched the organization grow from one building downtown to several on two campuses and outside of Cedar Falls. Her job transitioned to working with Medicaid applications in the early 1990s as the financial resources liaison,

where she lived until passing away in Feb. 2021.

"They took such good care of her at Thuesen Cottage," Peg reflects, noting the additional comfort of having her so close by for frequent visits.

Peg wanted a way to show appreciation and honor her mom's memory. Shirley loved being outdoors, especially in the mountains. She worked with her husband at Grand Teton National Park six months out of the year, then came home to lowa for six weeks before wintering in Texas.

Peg found the inspiration she needed during a trip to Cabela's in Prairie du Chien. She saw a wooden bench and, knowing that another family had

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provided a boulder with "Nation Cottage" etched on it as a memorial gift for the cottage next door, Peg presented her idea and got the OK to proceed.



Greg happens to have a 40-year hobby of building wooden models; he's even built a model of the U.S.S. Arizona. He and Peg found slabs of wood at the What Cheer Flea Market this fall, and a vendor there who specializes in laser steel cutting did the lettering. Peg's son provided tree stumps, then Greg varnished everything before piecing it all together in one October afternoon.

The bench was installed at Thuesen Cottage in November, creating mixed emotions for Peg – sadness at the loss, but also a meaningful reminder of all the ways Shirley remains with them in spirit.

Western Home Communities launched a new version of its website December 17, including an updated online giving form for the foundation.


Donors to Western Home Foundation may now use the site to designate gifts to specific funds, provide a monthly recurring gift, and direct their gifts in honor or memory of someone.

Chaplain's Corner: Good news is meant to be shared

We love to share good news with others: a new baby, a promotion, a clean bill of health, even a win by our favorite team. This is equally true in the business world. Retailers rely on customers to pass along the good news of their shopping or dining experiences to others.

When I was in business, we found that 71% of our business came from happy customers who were willing to call us again; 27% of our business came from satisfied customers telling their friends to give us a try. So 98% of our business came from repeat customers or referrals.

This principle holds true in the spiritual realm. Scripture reveals God's plan for his people is to share the good news about God and his ways with others. In the Hebrew culture, religion was an integral part of everyday life, with daily experiences used as a classroom to teach the next generations about God.

I've heard it said: "The measure of good parenting is how the grandchildren turn out." I'm not sure that is totally accurate, but it is a good motivator. How do we pass along a spiritual inheritance so next generations will be "repeat customers" of what we teach them about God, then "referring" the good news on to the generations that follow them?

The Psalmist has some advice. "Great is the Lord and greatly to be praised; and his greatness is unsearchable. One generation shall praise your works to another and shall declare your mighty acts. I will meditate on the glorious splendor of your majesty and on your wondrous works." Psalm 145:3-5.

First, we must notice God. To do this in our lives takes intentionality and time. When was the last time you just sat and meditated on who God is? The creation around us and the words of our Bible declare to us God's greatness and glory. Will you recommit yourself to notice God and praise him for who he is?

Next, we must notice God's work in our lives and tell our family about it. That is the obligation of all who are following God and experiencing his wondrous work in their lives. Are you telling others – children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, friends – about what he is doing? If we follow Jesus, we have the best of all news to be shared, the work of salvation. We are told to go into all the world and share this good news, and it must begin with our family.

As we begin this new year, let me encourage us all to notice and praise God for who he is and what he does in our lives every day. Then let's share and spread that good news so it sticks in our families for generations to come.



WELLNESS RECIPE OF THE MONTH Stuffed Pepper Soup Enjoy this warm, hearty dish during a cold lowa winter!

Ingredients

- 2 pounds ground beef
- 1 small yellow onion diced
- 2 teaspoons minced garlic
- I teaspoon seasoned salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 30 ounces canned diced tomatoes
- 30 ounces plain tomato sauce
- 1/3 cup Worcestershire sauce
- 4 6 cups chicken broth
- 4 cups roughly chopped green bell peppers (3 medium peppers)
- 2 cups instant white rice

Instructions

- **1.** Brown ground beef in a large stock pot, drain. Add the onion, garlic and seasoned salt; cook until the onions are translucent
- 2. Pour in the diced tomatoes, tomato sauce, Worcestershire sauce and 4 cups of chicken broth. Bring to a simmer.
- **3.** Add the bell peppers; cover and cook for 20 minutes.
- **4.** Add in the rice and cook until done (about 5 minutes, or according to package directions).
- **5.** If needed, stir in the remaining chicken stock until the desired consistency has been reached.
